CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

• Satyawati College is a constituent college of the University of Delhi. The college ensures effective, transparent and timely delivery of the curriculum in a well-planned manner. An effective delivery of the curriculum is ensured by planning and preparedness, which is ingrained in our academic practices. • The curriculum is centrally designed by university departments and approved by the statutory bodies of the University, namely Academic Council and Executive Council. Colleges and departments have representation in these bodies through an election held once in two years. In the last five years, faculty members from Satyawati College have been part of these academic bodies and have actively contributed in the smooth functioning of teaching-learning. • In the Academic year 2017-18, Mr. Shashi Shekhar Prasad Singh, Assistant Professor, Department of Political Science, Satyawati College was an elected member of the Academic Council of the University of Delhi. In the same year, Dr. Bhuwan Kumar Jha, Assistant Professor in the Department of History of our college was a fulltime member of the Committee of Courses and Studies for Undergraduate Studies, University of Delhi. Other faculty members have also been actively involved in paper setting, framing courses and regular evaluation of semester exams. • The syllabi of every course consist of core papers and a wide array of optional courses- Discipline Specific Electives (DSE), Generic Electives (GE) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). While DSEs are restricted to students pursuing a particular course, GEs are interdisciplinary in nature. All these papers are integral to a successful completion of the course and each department meticulously works to achieve this target. Departmental meetings are held before commencement of each academic semester, where decisions regarding options to be offered are taken. • Timely publication of the time-table ensures on-time commencement of classes. Teachers invariably combine lectures with student presentations, group discussions, debates, field-visits etc. These modes of teaching-learning make classroom an exciting space both for students and the teacher. • Continuous internal assessment through assignments (individual and group), tests, projects, quizzes, presentations monitor progress of students. The process of internal evaluation prepares students for the term-end examinations conducted by the University as well as competitive job scenario. • Satyawati College aims at helping students acquire proficiency in language and encourages linguistic harmony. Sanskrit, Urdu, German, and French languages are being taught in the college and these departments organise seminars, conferences, quizzes, Hindi Divas, Mushaira etc. In order to ensure linguistic inclusivity, students are encouraged to participate in the different cultural programs organized throughout the year.

2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Internal Evaluation is largely according to the University's guidelines. The University mandates 10 marks for the assignment, 10 for the test and 5 for attendance. However, to encourage the students to engage more meaningfully with the Discipline of their choice, the teachers encourage students to come up with presentations. Class presentations, informed group discussions are some of the tools which enable students to engage in more meaningful ways. The college has two committees to address the grievances of the students at the departmental level and college level. The College also uploads the attendance record, which is a part of Internal Assessment, on its website for the students to verify it. Answer scripts of internal class tests, assignments and project reports are discussed with the students after evaluation. The students may raise their grievances regarding the marks awarded to them with the faculty concerned. In rare cases if students' grievances are not addressed satisfactorily, students are free to approach the departmental and if again not satisfied, approach the Central Moderation Committee

The date of commencement of the session, the date of its closing, the commencement of exams, the holidays etc. are followed by all colleges of the University including ours. • Satyawati College Union members are elected annually through a fair and democratic process of election which includes active participation of all students in voting and electing their student union leaders. • The Student Union consists of President, Vice-President, Secretary, Joint- Treasurer, Treasurer, Central and Executive Councillors. A most praiseworthy initiative of Student Union in 2017 -2018 has been in their continuous communication with the institute regarding problems faced by students, organising different kinds of events for students round the year. . The Student Council members help the faculty and administration in the admission process and the Orientation Programmes organised for new students annually. Funding for the activities organized by the council comes from the fees paid towards student aid fund, sponsorships, advertisements, donations etc. • The Students Union for the academic year 2017 -2018 organised Fresher's Welcome 'Satya Prarambh' and talent hunt programs for students to showcase their multifarious talents. It was followed by Blood Donation initiative on birth anniversary of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose jointly organised with National Cadet Corps. It has also been instrumental in conducting workshops for Defence Training for girls. This was done in association with Delhi Police and NCC. Students Union also conducted Debate Competition, Seminar and Cultural Fest, Ablaze. • The Student Advisory Committee actively encourages the Student Council to engage in a process of dialogue and consultation to help address student concerns. • Most departments also have a dedicated student society that helps in organising events such as orientation, fresher's, farewell as well as talks, webinars, workshops and competitions. The history society is named Shashwat, Politikos is for Political Science, English Literary Society (ELS) is for English department and Optima is for Economics, Prakriti for EVS only to name a few. These societies essentially have student members training them in responsibility and accountability, enabling them to take their positions in a competitive world. • Besides an active Student Union, each course also has a Class Representative (CR) who acts as a bridge between students and teachers. 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

We recognize the need to conserve natural resources and biodiversity, optimize energy efficiency, manage waste and educate our students about climate change and sustainability while addressing well-being of the students. College wastes, which can pose risks to environment and to public health are handled, collected, stored and disposed of in according to Solid Waste Management Rules, 2016. Liquid waste management is also keys to the environmentally friendly campus. The runoff from the terrace of the college building is channelized into recharge pits located at different locations. The runoff from unpaved area is intercepted in the front part of college by the underground collection pit. The college is sensitive towards research and development in the field of environmental conservation. A three-member panel from Satyawati College went to WWF regional headquarters at Delhi on 5th of November 2017 to attend the organizations conclave. The organization aims at conservation of species and their habitats, tackle climate change, promote water conservation, environmental education etc. The guiding principle of environmental consciousness includes awareness, attitude, skills, knowledge and participations. To promote this idea a field trip was organized to Kamala Nehru Ridge and Yamuna Biodiversity Park. The theme of the visit was to make students aware of the diversity among living organism which plays an essential role in conserving and promoting life on the earth. Under the guidance of Department of Environmental Studies, periodic cleanliness drives were conducted. Every Wednesday, students and teachers undertook cleanliness drive throughout the college to promote the idea of cleaner and greener campus.

The Society boasts of a football team which has taken part in NESSDU Sports Competition 2018 on 6th March 2018 and were successful in qualifying to the quarter finals. This accomplishment encouraged students from the North East to vigorously exhibit their potential. ? These are, Effect of Non- Ionizing Electro Magnetic Radiation emitted from Cell Phone on Innate Immune Response and Intra Cellular Signaling Pathway for a sanctioned grant of more than One Crore INR (1,13,35,822) by the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR).
